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The 2000 National Annenberg Election Survey (NAES) represents the largest ever public opinion study of the American electorate. For 14 months during the 2000 US presidential campaign and after the election, 79,458 US residents were interviewed by telephone about their perceptions and behaviors relevant to the campaign as well as the political system generally. Because some respondents were interviewed multiple times, in total 100,626 interviews were conducted.

The 2000 NAES was commissioned by the Annenberg School for Communication and the Annneberg Public Policy Center of the University of Pennsylvania. Sampling, fieldwork, data processing and technical documentation were directed by Princeton Survey Research Associates in conjunction with Schulman, Ronca \& Bucuvalas Inc.

The 2000 NAES comprises multiple components, among them:

- The majority of respondents interviewed for the 2000 NAES were interviewed as part of a 58,373 respondent national cross-section study, conducted continuously from mid December 1999, just before the height of the presidential primary election season, through mid January 2001, after the dispute over whether George W. Bush or AI Gore won the election and just before Bush's inauguration.
- During the spring presidential primaries, the national cross-section was supplemented by state-specific cross-section studies in key states.
- After their interview for either the national or a state-specific cross-section study, some respondents were reinterviewed to form prepost panels around key campaign events: the presidential primary elections, the summer Republican and Democratic presidential nominating conventions, the fall Bush-Gore debates and the November general election.
- Some respondents were reinterviewed up to three times.

The 2000 NAES is intended to facilitate both longitudinal analysis of the 2000 campaign as well as analysis of small subsets of the campaign. Cross-section interviewing was conducted daily, with an average of 50 to 300 interviews conducted each day for each crosssection study. Periods of high volume interviewing include:

- During the height of the presidential primary campaign, on average 100 national crosssection interviews were completed daily, and these were supplemented by hundreds of interviews daily for state-specific crosssections, plus reinterviews after the presidential primary elections to form prepost primary panels.
- From mid July through the general election, on average 300 national cross-section interviews were completed daily, plus hundreds of reinterviews daily after the presidential nominating conventions and Bush-Gore debates to form pre-post panels.
- During November and much of December 2000, the period of the disputed Florida vote, on average 100 national cross-section interviews were completed daily, and these were accompanied by reinterviews of 6508 respondents interviewed before the November election to form a pre-post general election panel.

All respondents were selected for interviewing at random, by the random selection of telephone numbers. To facilitate time series analysis, most of the cross-section studies were fielded as rolling cross-sections, meaning a special protocol was followed to maximize the representativeness of the sample of respondents interviewed on any single day.

Throughout the 14 months of interviewing and across the different interviewing components, the questionnaires administered to respondents, averaging 30 minutes, were a mix of questions common to large segments of the fieldwork and questions specific to small subsets. For example, core sets of questions about evaluations of candidates and the respondent's positions on policy issues were asked for most interviews. But highly eventtailored questions were asked around conventions and debates. And during the disputed Florida vote, roughly half of the questionnaire was devoted to this issue.

The focus of the 2000 NAES is the 2000 presidential campaign. However, a significant minority of the questions asked about general political attitudes and behaviors. In addition, a small set of questions was asked about voting in the general election for US representative and senator.

For the 2000 National Annenberg Election Survey, 79,458 randomly selected American adults were interviewed. Some of these respondents were interviewed more than once, yielding a total of 100,626 interviews over 14 months.

Cross-section studies Respondents interviewed once for the 2000 NAES were interviewed as part of one cross-section study:

- The national cross-section study;
- A state-specific pre-presidential primary election cross-section study;
- The New Hampshire or November 1999 addon cross-section studies.

Respondents interviewed more than once for the 2000 NAES were interviewed first as part of one cross-section-study:

- The national cross-section study;
- A state-specific pre-presidential primary election cross-section study.


## Pre-post campaign event panel studies

Respondents' interviews subsequent to their cross-section interview, or reinterviews, if any, were conducted as part of pre-post campaign event panel studies.

Selected respondents initially interviewed before the presidential primary election were reinterviewed after. These respondents' crosssection interviews matched with their reinterviews form pre-post presidential primary election panel studies. The cross-section interview represents pre-primary election measurements, and the reinterview represents post-primary measurements.

Similarly, selected respondents initially interviewed before the presidential nominating conventions, Bush-Gore debates or the general election were reinterviewed after. These respondents' cross-section interviews matched with their reinterviews form pre-post panel studies around the conventions, debates and general election.
Most respondents who were reinterviewed were reinterviewed only once, but some were reinterviewed up to three times.

## Main cross-section studies

## National cross-section study

58,373 randomly selected adult US residents were interviewed for the national cross-section study, inclusive of the 48 continental states and Washington, DC. Interviewing was conducted daily 14 Dec 99-19 Jan 01, representing the period just before the height of the presidential primary campaign through the day before Bush's inauguration. An average of at least 50 interviews were completed daily, and in key periods of the campaign, as many as 300 interviews were completed each day:

- 14 Dec 99-3 Jan 00, 962 national crosssection interviews were completed: on average 50 interviews daily.
- 4 Jan-3 Apr 00, representing roughly the height of the presidential primary campaign, 8556 interviews were completed: on average 100 daily.
- 4 Apr-17 Jul, 7447 interviews were completed: on average 50 daily.
- 18 Jul-6 Nov 00, representing the periods of the presidential nominating conventions and general election campaign, 34,391 interviews were completed: on average 300 daily.
- 8 Nov-19 Dec 00, representing the period of the disputed Florida vote through just after Gore's concession, 5296 interviews were completed: 100 daily.
- 20 Dec 00-19 Jan 01, 1721 interviews were completed: on average 50 daily.


## State-specific pre-presidential primary election cross-section studies

During the presidential primary campaign, the national cross-section was supplemented by state-specific cross-section studies conducted among residents of key primary states. Interviewing was conducted in the weeks before the states' presidential primary elections:

- 3173 randomly selected adult residents of lowa (IA) were interviewed for the IA prepresidential primary election cross-section study. Interviewing was conducted daily 14 Dec 99-23 Jan 00, the day before the 24 Jan 00 IA presidential primary election. On average 100 interviews were completed daily.
- 3814 randomly selected adult residents of New Hampshire (NH) were interviewed for
the NH pre-presidential primary election cross-section study. Interviewing was conducted daily 14 Dec 99-31 Jan 00, the day before the 1 Feb NH presidential primary election. On average 100 interviews were completed daily.
- 6627 were interviewed for the Super Tuesday states pre-presidential primary election cross-section study, inclusive of randomly selected adult residents of states holding all presidential primary voting 7 Mar, Super Tuesday: California (CA), Connecticut (CT), Georgia (GA), Maine (ME), Maryland (MD), Massachusetts (MA), Missouri (MO), New York (NY), Ohio (OH), Rhode Island (RI), Vermont (VT), Washington (WA). ${ }^{1}$ Interviewing was conducted daily 4 Jan-6 Mar 00, the day before Super Tuesday. On average 100 interviews were completed daily.
- 1591 were interviewed for the Second Tuesday states pre-presidential primary election cross-section study, inclusive of randomly selected adult residents of states holding their presidential primary election 14 Mar, so-called Second Tuesday: Florida (FL), Louisiana (LA), Mississippi (MS), Oklahoma (OK), Tennessee (TN), Texas (TX). Interviewing was conducted daily 28 Feb-13 Mar, the day before Second Tuesday. On average 100 interviews were completed daily.

South Carolina (SC) and Michigan (MI) held Republican presidential primary voting nearly a month before Democratic voting. In these states, pre-Republican presidential primary election cross-sections were conducted:

- 1171 randomly selected adult residents of SC were interviewed for the SC pre-Republican presidential primary election cross-section study. Interviewing was conducted daily 1 18 Feb, the day before the 19 Feb SC Republican presidential primary election. (Democratic voting in the SC presidential primary was held 9 Mar.) On average 50 interviews were completed daily.

[^0]- 388 randomly selected adult residents of MI were interviewed for the MI pre-Republican presidential primary election cross-section study. Interviewing was conducted daily 1521 Feb, the day before the 22 Feb MI Republican presidential primary election. (Democratic voting in the MI presidential primary was held 11 Mar.) On average 50 interviews were completed daily.


## Pre-post campaign event panel studies

## Reinterviews of state-specific cross-section respondents to form pre-post presidential primary election panels

- 1596 respondents interviewed for the IA prepresidential primary election cross-section study were reinterviewed after the 24 Jan 00 election, 26 Jan- 17 Feb 00 . The IA pre-post presidential primary election panel study comprises each respondent's cross-section interview matched with their reinterview.
- 1900 respondents interviewed for the NH pre-presidential primary election crosssection study were reinterviewed after the 1 Feb election, 2-27 Feb. The NH pre-post presidential primary election panel study comprises each respondent's cross-section interview matched with their reinterview.
- 3853 respondents interviewed for the Super Tuesday states pre-presidential primary election cross-section study were reinterviewed after the 7 Mar election, 10 Mar-6 Apr. The Super Tuesday states prepost presidential primary election panel study comprises each respondent's crosssection interview matched with their reinterview.
- 503 respondents interviewed for the SC preRepublican presidential primary election cross-section study were reinterviewed after the 19 Feb Republican election, 23 Feb-8 Mar. The SC pre-post Republican presidential primary election panel study comprises each respondent's cross-section interview matched with their reinterview.
- 145 respondents interviewed for the MI preRepublican presidential primary election cross-section study were reinterviewed after the 22 Feb Republican election, 24 Feb- 8 Mar. The MI pre-post Republican presidential primary election panel study comprises each respondent's cross-section interview matched with their reinterview.

Reinterviews of national cross-section respondents to form pre-post presidential nominating convention panels

- 1197 respondents interviewed for the national cross-section study immediately before the Republican presidential nominating convention were reinterviewed after the 31 Jul-3 Aug convention. Reinterviews were conducted 4-13 Aug among those interviewed for the national cross-section 21-30 Jul. The pre-post Republican presidential nominating convention panel study comprises each respondent's cross-section interview matched with their reinterview.
- 1230 respondents interviewed for the national cross-section study immediately before the Democratic presidential nominating convention were reinterviewed after the 14-17 Aug convention. Reinterviews were conducted 18-27 Aug among those interviewed for the national cross-section 413 Aug. The pre-post Democratic presidential nominating convention panel study comprises each respondent's crosssection interview matched with their reinterview.

Reinterviews of national cross-section respondents to form pre-post Bush-Gore debate panels

- 1514 respondents interviewed for the national cross-section study immediately before the 3 Oct Bush-Gore debate were reinterviewed after the debate. Reinterviews were conducted 4-10 Oct among those interviewed for the national cross-section 21 Sep-2 Oct. The pre-post 3 Oct Bush-Gore debate panel study comprises each respondent's cross-section interview matched with their reinterview.
- 670 respondents interviewed for the national cross-section study immediately before the 11 Oct Bush-Gore debate were reinterviewed after the debate. Reinterviews were conducted 12-16 Oct among those interviewed for the national cross-section 410 Oct. The pre-post 11 Oct Bush-Gore debate panel study comprises each respondent's cross-section interview matched with their reinterview.
- 2052 respondents interviewed for the national cross-section study before the 17 Oct Bush-Gore debate were reinterviewed after the debate. Reinterviews were
conducted 18-31 Oct among those
interviewed for the national cross-section immediately before the debate, 12-16 Oct, as well as those interviewed immediately before the Republican presidential nominating convention, 21-30 Jul, or the Democratic convention, 4-13 Aug. The prepost 17 Oct Bush-Gore debate panel study comprises each respondent's cross-section interview matched with their reinterview.


## Reinterviews of national cross-section respondents to form a pre-post general election panel

6508 respondents interviewed for the national cross-section study anytime in 2000 before the general election were reinterviewed after the 7 Nov 00 election. Reinterviews were conducted 11 Nov-7 Dec 00 among those interviewed for the national cross-section 3 Jan-6 Nov 00. The pre-post general election panel study comprises each respondent's cross-section interview matched with their reinterview.

## Multiple reinterview panels

- Multiple reinterview panel A Some respondents initially interviewed for the national cross-section study immediately before the Republican or Democratic presidential nominating convention and reinterviewed after as part of a pre-post convention panel study were reinterviewed one or two additional times: after the 17 Oct Bush-Gore debate as part of this debate's pre-post panel, and/or after the general election as part of the pre-post general election panel.
- Multiple reinterview panel B Some respondents initially interviewed for the national cross-section study immediately before one of the Bush-Gore debates and reinterviewed after as part of a pre-post debate panel study were also reinterviewed after the general election as part of the prepost general election panel.

## Add-on cross-section studies

- NH post-presidential primary election crosssection study After the 1 Feb NH presidential primary election, a cross-section study of 1835 randomly selected NH adult
residents was fielded 2-22 Feb, alongside NH post-primary reinterviews. This cross-section study is separate from the NH pre-primary cross-section study and is documented in the companion publication New Hampshire PostPresidential Primary Election Cross-Section.
- November 1999 national cross-section study Prior to the 14 Dec 99 start of the national cross-section study, a separate national cross-section study of 2486 randomly selected adults was fielded 8 Nov-13 Dec 99. This study is documented in the companion publication November 1999 National CrossSection and is available upon request from the Annenberg Public Policy Center.

## Sampling and interviewing protocols

Each interview was conducted by telephone and averaged 30 minutes. Interviews were conducted in English or Spanish at the respondent's preference.
Fieldwork for all interviewing components except the SC and MI pre-Republican presidential primary election cross-sections and post-Republican primary reinterviews was conducted by Schulman, Ronca \& Bucuvalas Inc. of New York and Ft. Myers, Florida. The SC and MI studies were conducted by Princeton Data Source of Fredericksburg, Virginia.

Cross-section sampling Respondents were selected for cross-section study samples via a two-stage process:

- First, households were randomly selected by randomly generating telephone numbers. Area code, exchange and bank, representing the first eight digits of a 10 digit phone number, were randomly generated proportional to telephone company estimates of the count of household numbers in each combination of area code, exchange and bank. The last two digits of each phone number were generated entirely at random.
- Second, at each sampled number that was determined to represent a household, interviewers attempted to randomly select one of the adult residents, 18 or older, to interview. Upon calling a household, interviewers asked to speak with any adult, who was then asked how many adults live in the household. For households with more than one adult, one was randomly chosen to be interviewed by birthday. For the questions used to select respondents, see annex B.

Interviewers called each sampled telephone number up to 18 times over 14 days-twice on each of the first four days and once on each of the remaining days-to determine if the number represented a household with an adult, and if so, to attempt to select a respondent and complete an interview.
Phone work was conducted from 10 am through 11 pm , local to the respondent (through 2 am eastern time). In attempting to contact households and respondents, interviewers accommodated both specific appointments (e.g., "Please call me Friday at noon") and more general callback requests
("tomorrow afternoon," "later this week," "another time").

If a household refused to participate-either no adult would give the number of adults living in the household so that one could be selected, or once a respondent was selected he or she would not agree to be interviewed-it was scheduled to be called back by an interviewer specially trained to elicit participation (refusal conversion), assuming 18 attempts over 14 days had not yet been made. Additionally, if a respondent started but stopped an interview (breakoff), attempts were made to recontact the respondent and complete the interview.

Rolling cross-section sample management All cross-section studies, with the exception of the SC and MI pre-Republican presidential primary election cross-sections, were fielded as rolling cross-section samples. New randomly generated telephone numbers were added on a strict schedule to the pool of numbers interviewers were calling to attempt to complete interviews: Every day of fieldwork, a set count of new numbers was added, proportional to the desired count of interviews completed daily. The intention was to maximize the representativeness of any single day's sample by stabilizing the proportion of respondents interviewed who completed an interview after having been called only a few times and those who completed after having been tried numerous times. See Romer et al., Capturing Campaign Dynamics: the National Annenberg Election Survey Design, Method and Data (Oxford, 2003).

Reinterview sampling Reinterview samples are random subsets of cross-section samples. For example, the sample of respondents interviewed 4-13 Aug for the post-Republican presidential nominating convention reinterview is a random subset of respondents interviewed 21-30 Jul for the national cross-section.

In cross-section interviews, respondents' first names were collected. For reinterviewing, interviewers asked for respondents by name and confirmed that the right respondent was selected by comparing sex and age with the data recorded in the cross-section interview.
Interviewers called each sampled reinterview respondent up to 20 times. The date of the first reinterview attempt is orthogonal to the date the cross-section interview was completed.

## Variable sections

Variables measured for the 2000 National Annenberg Election Survey are organized into 23 sections, named 0 (zero) and $A$ through $Y$ (no $\mathrm{I}, \mathrm{O}$ or Q ). The lengthy B section is organized into subsections:

## Random assignment to paired lines of questioning

In some cases, respondents were randomly assigned to one variable or set of variables representing half of a pair of similar questions or question sets [upper diagram this page].

The detailed variable listing cross-references the questionnaires [b], and vice versa [c]. In some cases, a single variable is derived from multiple questions [d], and vice versa.

Random question element orders In many cases, the orders of question elements were randomized, and this is indicated in the questionnaires $[\mathbf{e}, \mathbf{f}, \mathbf{g}]$. In a few cases, random question element orders are recorded in variables [ $\mathbf{h}, \mathbf{i}$ ]; this affects variables in sections A, B, F and R. Note that in most cases random orders indicated in the questionnaire are not recorded in variables.

Question wording and response options Both the detailed variable listing and the questionnaires include the full text of all questions as they were asked of respondents.
Accepted response options are enumerated in both the detailed variable listing [j] and the questionnaires [k].
For questions prompting respondents to respond by choosing among read response options, the options read are specified in the question text [I].
Response options not specified in the question text were not read but accepted if volunteered [m]. Don't know and no answer were not read, and values 998 and 999 are reserved for these responses, respectively, except where indicated otherwise.

Variation in question wording by interview point and date is indicated with braces ( $\}$ ). See variation by interview point and date on page i21.


## Data file format

Data are stored in SPSS format (.sav) and tab delimited (.dat) files as listed on page i-8. For the tab delimited files, each case is a line, with the first line containing the variable names.

In most cases, each codebook variable corresponds to a single data file variable of the same name [a, diagram this page] containing only numeric values. When these represent codes for categorical [b] or interval, indicated by range, [c] data, they are enumerated in the detailed variable listing. When no values are enumerated, the data are numeric literals [d].

Alphanumeric values Variables cST and rST (state; see section 0 ) and those ending in \$ (see responses transcribed verbatim below) contain alphanumeric values.

Null values For numeric data file variables, the null value is missing; for alphanumeric variables, an empty string. See also pages i-1217 and multiple-mention responses below.

Multiple-mention responses In most cases, respondents were prompted to respond to questions by choosing one accepted response. But in some cases, respondents were allowed, though not required, to choose multiple responses. This is indicated by $\mathbf{x}$ mentions recorded, where $x$ is the number of mentions. Each mention is recorded, in the order of mention, in a data file variable named the same as the codebook variable plus the mention index. For mentions not named, the corresponding data file variables are null.

For example, for cE19, respondents were allowed to mention up to five talk radio hosts [e], with each mention recorded in data file variables cE19.1 through cE19.5 [f]. If a respondent first named Rush Limbaugh and then Howard Stern, cE19.1 is 13, cE19.2 is 17 and cE19.3 through cE19.5 are null.

Responses transcribed verbatim Some responses were transcribed verbatim, indicated by verbatim and \$, and recorded in a data file variable pair: a numeric variable indicating a verbatim response and an alphanumeric variable with the text of the response.
For example, if a problem was named for cB01, data file variable cB01 is 1 [ $\mathbf{g}$ ], and cB01\$ is the transcript of the response [h]. For cE19, if talk radio hosts not represented by values 1-18
were named as the second mention, cE19.2 is 19 [ $\mathbf{i}]$, and cE19\$ is the hosts' names [j].

## Interview point and date notation

Cross-section interview and reinterview points are abbreviated as listed on pages $\mathrm{i}-12$ and $\mathrm{i}-14$, respectively.

Dates are written as d mmm or $\mathrm{dmmm} y$. Month is abbreviated as the first three letters. References to November, December and January are qualified with year (99, 00, 01); references to other months are assumed to be 2000. For example, 1 Jan 00, 1 Feb.

Where d is a date:

- $\mathbf{d}_{1}-\mathbf{d}_{2}$ means dates $\mathrm{d}_{1}$ through $\mathrm{d}_{2}$, inclusive; for example, 1-30 Sep, 1 Sep-31 Oct, 1 Sep30 Nov 00, 1 Dec 00-19 Jan 01;
- $\mathbf{d}_{1}, \mathbf{d}_{2}$ means dates $\mathrm{d}_{1}$ and $\mathrm{d}_{2}$;
- $\mathbf{d}_{1}-\mathbf{d}_{2}, \mathbf{d}_{3}-\mathbf{d}_{4}, \mathbf{d}_{5}$ means dates $\mathrm{d}_{1}$ through $\mathrm{d}_{2}, \mathrm{~d}_{3}$ through $\mathrm{d}_{4}$ and $\mathrm{d}_{5}$;
- starting d means dates $d$ and after; for example, starting 1 Sep;
- through d means dates $d$ and before; for example, through 31 Aug.

Where $p$ is an interviewing point and $d$ a date:

- p d means interviewing point $p$ for date $d$; for example, Nat CS 1 Sep;
- $\mathbf{p ~ d} \mathbf{d}_{1}-\mathbf{d}_{2}$ means interviewing point $p$ for dates $d_{1}$ through $d_{2}$; for example, Nat CS 1-30 Sep;
- $\mathbf{p}_{1}, \mathbf{p}_{2} \mathbf{d}_{1}-\mathbf{d}_{2}$ means interviewing points $p_{1}$ and $p_{2}$, both for dates $d_{1}$ through $d_{2}$; for example, IA CS, NH CS 3-23 Jan 00;
- $\mathbf{p}_{1}, \mathbf{p}_{\mathbf{2}} \mathbf{d}_{1}-\mathbf{d}_{\mathbf{2}^{2}} ; \mathbf{p}_{\mathbf{3}}, \mathbf{p}_{4} \mathbf{d}_{\mathbf{3}}-\mathbf{d}_{4}$ means interviewing points $p_{1}$ and $p_{2}$, both for dates $d_{1}$ through $d_{2}$, and interviewing points $p_{3}$ and $p_{4}$, both for dates $\mathrm{d}_{3}$ through $\mathrm{d}_{4}$.

Whenever interview points are specified without dates, the full field period is assumed. For example, Nat CS implies Nat CS 14 Dec 9919 Jan 01.

Whenever dates are specified without interview points, all intersecting interview points are assumed. For example, for a cross-section variable, 14-31 Dec 99 implies Nat CS, IA CS, NH CS 14-31 Dec 99.

In some cases, except is used in conjunction with starting or through; starting d except $p_{1}, \mathbf{p}_{2}$ means all interviewing points intersecting with dates $d$ and after, except interviewing points $p_{1}$ and $p_{2}$. For example, starting 1 Feb except SC CS, MI CS.

## Variation by interview point and date

Terms varying by interview point and/or date are enclosed in braces ( $\}$ ), with mutually exclusive variants separated by vertical bars (|). Where a and d are nonvarying terms, and c is a term applicable only for interview points and dates b :

## Notes on variables in this section

Interview point (INT) For cross-section studies, cINT indicates the cross-section study. For example, cINT[101] indicates the national cross-section study.

Pre-post campaign event panel studies are pairings of data from cross-section interviews and reinterviews. For panel studies, cINT indicates the cross-section interview point, and rINT indicates the reinterview point. For example, for the pre-post Republican presidential nominating convention panel study, cINT[101] and rINT[601].

Respondent key (KEY) Each respondent is uniquely identified by an 11 digit key. The first three digits of the key indicate the cross-section study of the respondent's initial interview. For example, key 20210055757 indicates that the respondent was initially interviewed as part of the NH pre-presidential primary election crosssection (cINT[202]).

Cross-section interview and reinterview data are matched into panel studies by cKEY and rKEY. For example, respondent 20210055757 was interviewed as part of the NH prepresidential primary election cross-section and reinterviewed after the primary as part of the pre-post NH presidential primary election panel. In the panel data file CKEY and rKEY are 20210055757.

## Notes on variables in this section

The core measure is favorability on a zero (unfavorable) to 100 (favorable) scale. In addition, respondents were asked to judge the traits and political ideology of some candidates. (See V04 for the respondent's own political ideology on the same scale.) And respondents were asked to provide a one-word descriptor for some candidates as well as judge what emotions candidates made them feel. See page A-3 for a summary of which key questions were asked about which candidates and political figures.

## Candidate name recognition screen: traits, ideology and emotions

- Through early April, for questions about candidate traits, ideology and emotions, the respondent base was limited to those who recognized the name of one or more of the candidates referenced in the question. Recognition was derived from favorability ratings, with a rating of zero to 100 counting as recognition, and an answer of "don't know" (codes 101-102) or no answer (999) counting as lack of recognition. For crosssection interviews, this name recognition screen was in effect through 3 Apr; for reinterviews, the screen was in effect for post-primary reinterviews.

Some variables in other sections also make use of this screen. See sections B, D and N.

Lieberman favorability A49 overlaps with U24. See section U.

Random question order: candidate traits

- Starting early April, respondents were randomly assigned (AZ01) to be asked questions about Bush's (A02-A08) and Gore's (A12-A18) traits in one of two orders: traits within candidate (Does trait X describe Bush? Does trait Y describe Bush? ... Does trait $X$ describe Gore? Does trait $Y$ describe Gore? ...; AZ01[1]) or candidates within traits (Does trait $X$ describe Bush? Does trait $X$ describe Gore? Does trait $Y$ describe Bush? Does trait Y describe Gore? ...; AZ01[2]). For cross-section interviews, this random question order was in effect 4 Apr-19 Dec 00; for reinterviews, the random order was in effect for post-convention, post-debate and post-general election reinterviews. Other times, all respondents were asked traits within candidates.

\section*{Perceptions of presidential candidates' policy positions}
- Through early spring, respondents were asked about Bush's policy positions in comparison with McCain's (see also Forbes below), and Gore's relative to Bradley's. For cross-section interviews, this line of questioning was in effect through 8 Mar for questions about Gore and Bradley, through 3 Apr for questions about Bush and McCain. For reinterviews, this line of questioning was in effect for IA and NH post-primary reinterviews for Gore and Bradley; IA, NH, Super Tuesday, SC and MI post-primary reinterviews for Bush and McCain.
- Questions comparing Bush's and McCain's policy positions also asked about Forbes, prior to the end of his candidacy. For crosssection interviews, questioning about Forbes' policy positions continued through 13 Feb; for reinterviews, Forbes was referenced in these questions for IA and NH post-primary reinterviews.
- Starting early April, respondents were asked about Bush's positions in comparison with Gore's. For cross-section interviews, this line of questioning was in effect starting 4 Apr ; for reinterviews, this line of questioning was in effect for post-convention, post-debate and post-general election reinterviews.
- After the general election (starting 8 Nov 00), questions about Bush's and Gore's policy positions were asked in the past tense, referencing the campaign (e.g., During the campaign, did Bush favor or oppose X ?).

\section*{Candidate name recognition screen}
- Through early April, questions about candidates' policy positions and competencies were limited to respondents who recognized at least one of the candidates in the question. For cross-section interviews, this name recognition screen was in effect through 3 Apr; for reinterviews, the screen was in effect for post-primary
reinterviews. Recognition was derived from favorability ratings. See section A.

## Notes on variables in this section

For the Bush-Gore debates, respondents were asked if they watched the debate or debates (the 3 Oct debate, F35; the 11 Oct debate, F41; the 17 Oct debate, F47; the three debates generally, F53). If no, they were asked if they were aware of the debate or debates (F36, F42, F48, F54). Respondents who watched or were aware were asked if Bush or Gore performed better (F37, F43, F49, F55). Those who watched (but not those just aware) were asked if Bush performed as expected (F38, F44, F50, F56) and if Gore performed as expected (F39, F45, F51, F57).

Random question order: Bush's and Gore's performance FZ01 records the random order in which respondents who watched Bush-Gore debates were asked if Bush or Gore performed better, if Bush performed as expected and if Gore performed as expected.

## Notes on variables in this section: voter registration

- For cross-section interviews before the general election (through 6 Nov 00), respondents were asked if they were registered to vote by the time of the interview (R02). In addition, voter registration was confirmed (R03) for, through 17 Jul, those interviewed pre-presidential primary election (see presidential primary election status below), and starting 18 Jul, all.
- For cross-section interviews after the general election (starting 8 Nov 00), respondents were asked if they were registered to vote for the general election (R04), and registration was confirmed (R05).
- For IA, NH and Super Tuesday post-primary reinterviews, respondents were asked if they were registered to vote for the presidential primary election (R02a).
- For SC and MI post-Republican primary reinterviews, respondents were asked if they were registered to vote for the Republican presidential primary election (R02b).
- For post-convention reinterviews, respondents were asked if they were
registered to vote by the time of the interview, and registration was confirmed.
- For post-general election reinterviews, respondents were asked if they were registered to vote for the general election, and registration was confirmed.

Note that voter registration was not used to screen any questions about intended or actual voting.

## Intended and actual voting in the presidential primary

Questioning regarding presidential primary voting was tailored based on if the respondent was interviewed before or after their state's primary election.

## Presidential primary election status

R01 records if the respondent was interviewed pre- or post-presidential primary election. In general (see also special cases below):

- Respondents interviewed before the day of their state's presidential primary election are classified interviewed pre-presidential primary election (R01[1]).
- Those interviewed after their state's primary election are classified interviewed postprimary (R01[2]).
- Respondents interviewed on the day of the election are classified presidential primary election status undesignated (R01[4]).

See page R-7 for primary election dates.

## Special cases: presidential primary election status

- States with primary voting on multiple dates: national cross-section study In the following states, presidential primary voting was held on multiple dates: AZ, DE, ID, MI, MN, ND, NV, SC, VA, WY. For the national cross-section study, respondents in these states interviewed 25 Jan 00 through the day of their state's last presidential primary election are classified presidential primary election status undesignated. For example, AZ held Republican presidential primary voting 22 Feb and Democratic voting 11 Mar; national cross-section study respondents in AZ interviewed 25 Jan- 11 Mar 00 are classified presidential primary election status undesignated. Starting 12 Mar, they are
classified interviewed post-presidential primary election.
- SC pre-Republican primary election crosssection study In SC, Republican presidential primary voting was held 19 Feb, before Democratic voting 9 Mar. National cross-section study respondents living in SC interviewed 25 Jan-9 Mar 00 are classified presidential primary election status undesignated (see above). But respondents in the SC pre-Republican presidential primary election cross-section study are classified interviewed pre-presidential primary election.
- MI pre-Republican primary election crosssection study Similarly, in MI, Republican presidential primary voting was held 22 Feb, before Democratic voting 11 Mar. National cross-section study respondents living in MI interviewed 25 Jan-11 Mar 00 are classified presidential primary election status undesignated. But respondents in the MI preRepublican presidential primary election cross-section study are classified interviewed pre-primary election.
- SC and MI post-Republican primary reinterviews For SC and MI postRepublican presidential primary reinterviews, respondents are classified interviewed post-Republican presidential primary election (R01[3]).


## Line of questioning

In general, respondents interviewed prepresidential primary election were asked about intended voting, and respondents interviewed post-presidential primary were asked about actual voting. In addition, starting in mid January, respondents interviewed prepresidential primary were first asked if they had early voted in the election; those who did were asked about actual rather than intended voting.
Specifically:

- Respondents interviewed pre-presidential primary election were asked if they intended to vote in the primary (R07-R08). If yes, they were asked if they intended to vote in the Republican or Democratic primary (R09) and for which candidate (R10-R12; see intended presidential primary balloting below). Respondents who intended to vote in the presidential primary were also asked if they planned to early vote (R13-R14).
- In addition to the above, starting 18 Jan 00, respondents interviewed pre-presidential primary election, with the exception of the IA cross-section study, were first asked if they had early voted in the election. If yes, they are recorded as having voted (R15) early (R19) and were asked instead about their voting (R16-R18, R20, R21; see post-primary questioning below). If no, they are recorded as not having voted (R15) and were asked about intended voting (R07-R14).
- Respondents interviewed post-presidential primary election were asked if they voted in the primary (R15). If yes, they were asked if they voted in the Republican or Democratic primary (R16) and for which candidate (R17R18). Respondents who voted were also asked if they voted early (R19) and if yes, how (R20, R21) and if they regretted doing so (R22).
- SC and MI reinterview respondents interviewed post-Republican presidential primary election were asked if they voted in the Republican primary (R15a). If yes, they were asked which candidate they voted for (R17). Respondents who voted in the Republican primary were also asked if they voted early (R19a) and if yes, how (R20a, R21a) and if they regretted doing so (R22a).

The figure on page R-5 summarizes the line of questioning for intended and actual voting in the presidential primary.

## Intended presidential primary balloting

The respondent base for intended balloting in the Republican presidential primary (R11) includes those who intended to vote in the primary election (R07[1]) and either intended to vote in the Republican election (R09[1]) or did not specify if they would vote in the Republican or Democratic election (R09[998-999]) but said they were following the Republican presidential primary campaign more closely than the Democratic campaign (R10[1]).

Similarly, the respondent base for intended balloting in the Democratic presidential primary (R12) includes those who intended to vote in the primary election and either intended to vote in the Democratic election (R09[2]) or did not specify if they would vote in the Republican or Democratic election but said they were following the Democratic presidential primary campaign more closely than the Republican campaign (R10[2]).

Note that R10, if the respondent was following the Republican or Democratic presidential primary campaign more closely, was intended solely to calculate the respondent bases for R11-R12. R10 was asked only of those who intended to vote in the presidential primary but did not specify if they would vote in the Republican or Democratic election.

## Intended and actual voting in the general presidential election

- Through 1 Oct, respondents were asked which presidential candidate they intended to vote for in the general election (R23-R29; see general election trial heats below). Respondents were then asked if they intended to vote in the general election (R30R31) and if yes, if they intended to vote early (R32-R33).
- 2 Oct through before the general election (6 Nov 00), respondents were asked if they had early voted in the general election. If yes, they are recorded as having voted (R34) early (R36) and were asked instead about their voting (R35, R37-R38; see post-election questioning below). If no, they are recorded as not having voted (R34) and were asked about intended voting (R23-R33).
- After the general election (starting 8 Nov 00), respondents were asked if they voted in the general election (R34). If yes, they were asked which presidential candidate they voted for (R35) and if they voted early (R36). Those who voted early were asked how (R37-R38) and if they regretted doing so (R39-R40). Those who did not vote in the general election were asked which presidential candidate they might have voted for (R41).

The figure on page R-6 summarizes the line of questioning for intended and actual voting in the general election.

Note that for intended voting in the general presidential election, respondents were first asked which presidential candidate they would vote for, then if they intended to participate in the election. By contrast, for intended voting in the presidential primary election, respondents were first asked if they intended to participate in the election, and then those who intended to participate were asked which candidate they would vote for.

## General election trial heats

Intended balloting for president in the general election was measured with multiple trial heat questions:

- Through 8 Mar, respondents were asked which presidential candidate they would vote for in the general election given four matchups: Bush vs. Gore (R23), McCain vs. Gore (R24), Bush vs. Bradley (R25) and McCain vs. Bradley (R26).
- 9 Mar-3 Apr, respondents were asked about Bush vs. Gore and McCain vs. Gore.
- 4 Apr-17 Jul, respondents were asked about Bush vs. Gore.
- 18 Jul-7 Sep, respondents were asked about Bush vs. Gore and Bush vs. Gore vs. Buchanan vs. Nader (R27).
- Starting 8 Sep, respondents were asked about Bush vs. Gore and Bush vs. Gore vs. Buchanan vs. Nader. In addition, those who did not say they would vote for Bush were asked if there was any chance they would (R28). And those who did not say they would vote for Gore were asked if there was any chance they would (R29).


## Random question and response orders

RZ02-RZ05 record the random order in which the presidential candidates were read as response options in trial heat questions R23R26. For example, RZ02[2] means Gore was read before Bush in R23.

RZ01 records the random order in which respondents were asked if they would vote for Bush or Gore (R23) or Bush, Gore, Buchanan or Nader (R27). For example, if RZ01[2], respondents were asked R27 and then R23.

RZ06 records the random order in which the presidential candidates were read as response options in trial heat question R27. Similarly, RZ07 records the random order in which the presidential candidates were read as response options in R35, actual general election balloting for president. For RZ06 and RZ07, order is represented as abcd, where a is the candidate read first, $b$ the candidate read second, $c$ the candidate read third and $d$ the candidate read fourth. For each digit of abcd, 1 is Bush, 2 is Gore, 3 is Buchanan and 4 is Nader. For example, 2413 means the candidates were read Gore, Nader, Bush, Buchanan.

## Data collection errors

- Intended and actual voting in the presidential primary For the national and NH and Super Tuesday states prepresidential primary election cross-section studies 18 Jan 00, cR03 and cR06-cR22 were inadvertently not measured. These cases are coded 999.
- cR13-cR14 For the national cross-section study 16-20 Apr, cR13-cR14 were inadvertently not measured. These cases are coded 999.

- the configuration of major general election candidates for US representative in the respondent's Congressional district (U03U07; see configuration of major general election candidates below);
- the configuration of major general election candidates for US senator in the respondent's state (U17-U21; see candidate configuration below).


## Estimation of Congressional district

Congressional district (U01) is an estimate calculated by the provider of the sample, Survey Sampling Inc., based on the respondent's phone number.

## Congressional primary election status

U02 records if the respondent was interviewed pre- or post-Congressional primary election:

- Respondents interviewed before the day of their state's Congressional primary election
are classified interviewed pre-Congressional primary election (U02[1]).
- Those interviewed after their state's primary election are classified interviewed postprimary (U02[2]).
- Respondents interviewed on the day of the election are classified Congressional primary status undesignated (U02[4]).
- DC residents are classified no Congressional primary (U02[3]).

See page R-7 for Congressional primary dates. See also special cases below.

## Configuration of major general election candidates

U03 indicates if the respondent is living in a Congressional district where the incumbent US representative is running for re-election or retiring. U05 indicates the number of major challenging candidates running in the general election for US representative. When there are two challenging candidates, the challengers are ordered alphabetically by last name. U04, U06 and U07 indicate the party of US House incumbents and candidates. U16 indicates if the incumbent, first major challenger or second major challenger won the seat.
The US House configuration recorded for a respondent is derived from estimated Congressional district (see above). See page U17 for US House incumbents and candidates.

U17 indicates if the respondent is living in a state where an incumbent US senator is running for re-election or retiring, or where no Senate seat is up for election. U19 indicates the number of major challenging candidates running in the general election for US senator. When there are two challenging candidates, the challengers are ordered alphabetically by last name. U18, U20 and U21 indicate the party of US Senate candidates. U29 indicates if the incumbent, first major challenger or second major challenger won the seat.

## Name recall and favorability

Respondents were asked to recall the names and rate the favorability of US House and Senate incumbents and major general election
candidates. The line of questioning differed by if the respondent was interviewed pre- or postCongressional primary:

- Respondents interviewed pre-Congressional primary election were asked to recall the name of their incumbent US representative (U08) and rate this official's favorability (incumbent running for re-election, U10; incumbent retiring, U11). Respondents were asked to recall the names of their incumbent US senators (U22) and, if living in a state with an incumbent senator running for reelection, rate this official's favorability (U24).
- Respondents interviewed postCongressional primary election were asked to recall the names of the major candidates running in the general election for US representative (U09). Those living in a state with a Senate race were asked to recall the names of the major general election candidates running for US senator (U23).
- Starting 27 Sep, in addition to the above, respondents living in a state with a Senate race were asked to rate the favorability of the major general election candidates for US Senate (incumbent candidate, U24; challengers U25-U25).
- Starting 6 Oct, in addition to the above, respondents were asked to rate the favorability of the major general election candidates for US representative (incumbent candidate, U10; challengers, U12-U13).

The figure on page U-4 summarizes the line of questioning for name recall and favorability.

## Intended and actual voting in Congressional general election

Respondents were asked about voting in the general election for US House and Senate. Note that some of this line of questioning includes questions recorded in section R. In particular, see intention to vote in the general election (R30) and actual voting in the general election (R34).

- Before the general election (through 6 Nov 00), respondents not living in DC were asked which US representative candidate they would vote for in the general election (U14). Those living in a state with a Senate race were asked which US Senate candidate they would vote for in the general election (U27). In both cases, if respondents could not
provide a name, they were asked generically if they would vote for the Republican or Democrat. Note that respondents were first asked who they would vote for, then if they intended to vote (see R30).
- Starting 2 Oct, in addition to the above, respondents were first asked if they had early voted in the general election. If yes, they were asked instead about their voting (U15, U28; see post-election questioning below).
- After the general election (starting 8 Nov 00), respondents not living in DC who voted in the general election (see R34) were asked which US representative candidate they voted for (U15). Those living in a state with a Senate race who voted in the general election were asked which US Senate candidate they voted for (U28). In both cases, if respondents could not provide a name, they were asked generically if they voted for the Republican or Democrat.

## Special cases

- Lieberman favorability Favorability of Joe Lieberman is recorded in two variables: A49, representing Lieberman the vice presidential candidate, and U24, representing Lieberman the incumbent US senator running for reelection. Both of these variables are subsets of the same data, collected with one question. See also section $A$.
- LA Congressional primary election LA did not hold a Congressional primary election separate from the 7 Nov 00 general election. In each of LA's seven Congressional districts, the incumbent ran against numerous challengers. LA districts are classified as incumbent candidate for US representative (U03) and an undesignated number of major general election challenging candidates (U05)
- Paul Coverdell and Zell Miller (GA US Senate race) In mid July, GA US Senator Paul Coverdell died. Prior to his death, neither of GA's US Senate seats was up for re-election, but when Zell Miller was appointed to replace Coverdell through the end of the Congressional session, a special election for the seat was called for November 2000. Starting 26 Sep, GA was reclassified from a state with no US Senate race to a state with
an incumbent running for re-election against one major challenger (U17, U19).
- Mel Carnahan (MO US Senate race) In the MO US senator race, the major general election candidates were John Ashcroft, the incumbent, and Mel Carnahan, the challenger. In mid October, Carnahan died. Although he went on to win the election posthumously, and his seat was assumed by his wife Jean Carnahan, starting 17 Oct MO was reclassified from a state with one major general election challenging candidate for US senator to a state with none (U19). However, Mel Carnahan was still accepted as an open-ended response for U23 (recall of US Senate candidates) and U27-U28 (voting for US senator).


## Data collection errors

- cU09 For the national cross-section study 9-13 Aug, cU09 was inadvertently not measured for CO residents. These cases are coded 999.
- cU12 For the national cross-section study cU12 was inadvertently not measured for the following Congressional districts: AL-07 (Ed Martin), AR-01 (Susan Myshka), AZ-03 (Gene Scharer), FL-23 (Bill Lambert), NY-16 (Aaron Justice), VA-09 (Michael Osborne). These cases are coded 999.
- cU24 For the national cross-section study 29 Feb-3 Apr, cU24 was inadvertently not measured for RI residents. These cases are coded 999.

## Multiple reinterview panel A

Some respondents initially interviewed for the national cross-section study immediately before the Republican or Democratic presidential nominating convention and reinterviewed after as part of a pre-post convention panel study were reinterviewed one or two additional times: after the 17 Oct Bush-Gore debate as part of this debate's pre-post panel, and/or after the general election as part of the pre-post general election panel:

Of respondents interviewed 21-30 Jul for the national cross-section and reinterviewed 4-13 Aug for the pre-post Republican presidential nominating convention panel, 715 were reinterviewed one or two additional times:

- 688 were also reinterviewed 18-31 Oct for the pre-post 17 Oct Bush-Gore debate panel;
- 324 were also reinterviewed 11 Nov-7 Dec 00 for the pre-post general election panel;
- 297 were reinterviewed after both the 17 Oct debate and general election.

Of respondents interviewed 4-13 Aug for the national cross-section and reinterviewed 18-27 Aug for the pre-post Democratic presidential nominating convention panel, 696 were reinterviewed one or two additional times:

- 664 were also reinterviewed 18-31 Oct for the pre-post 17 Oct Bush-Gore debate panel;
- 326 were also reinterviewed 11 Nov-7 Dec 00 for the pre-post general election panel;
- 294 were reinterviewed after both the 17 Oct debate and general election.

- 275 respondents were interviewed $4-10$ Oct for the national cross-section, reinterviewed 12-16 Oct for the pre-post 11 Oct Bush-Gore debate panel and again reinterviewed 11 Nov-7 Dec 00 for the pre-post general election panel.
- 261 respondents were interviewed 12-16 Oct for the national cross-section, reinterviewed 18-31 Oct for the pre-post 17 Oct Bush-Gore debate panel and again reinterviewed 11 Nov-7 Dec 00 for the pre-post general election panel.
